Then add her duties as an elected official since 2006; her full-time position as the Chief Executive Officer of the non-profit Chandler Christian Center; and her latest role as chair for the Board of Directors of Valley Metro Regional Public Transportation Authority—well, one would assume she must be exhausted.



But, it seems, Donovan balances her many roles and responsibilities with ease. She says, even though she's busy, it's all work she enjoys, and that makes it manageable. She also maintains a strong focus on what's most important to her—to serve the public and to meet their human service needs.

"I developed my interest in public and human service through volunteerism at my church while growing up in Chandler," said Donovan.

After becoming an elected official, she agreed to work on transportation issues and was appointed by Chandler's mayor to serve on the board of Valley Metro, which is the agency that provides public transit and rideshare services in the greater Phoenix area.

"Transportation is a very important part of residents' quality of life, and the impact (of that) crosses

all income levels," said Donovan.

"I am extremely interested in what services residents feel they need."

Policy direction at Valley Metro comes from elected officials, who represent the 15 member cities and the county. The agency also oversees a second board that is devoted to light-rail services and their future growth in the Valley.

Her recent appointment to lead the board of directors of Valley Metro RPTA for the upcoming FY 2014-15 term comes after serving on the transit board since 2007.

“I’ve learned so much about transportation issues from working on both the budget and finance committees at Valley Metro,” said Donovan.

“During the recession, the agency made some difficult choices on route cutbacks, but it’s important to consider decisions on a regional level. As the chair, I expect to gather rider input on the best transit routes throughout the Valley.

“Specific to the East Valley, I see a need to improve service to the Price Corridor, as that is increasingly becoming an important employment center.”

Donovan moved to Chandler when she was in the second grade and graduated from Chandler High School. She has lived in the community ever since, with the exception of attending Stanford University, where she earned a bachelor’s degree in comparative studies in race and ethnicity, and a master’s in sociology.

She’s still active in her church and also performs service projects internationally. Most recently, she traveled to Ethiopia with Hope for the Hopeless to work with an orphanage.

Donovan has earned accolades Valley-wide for her diverse

accomplishments and humanity. She was recognized by *Phoenix Business Journal* as one of its “Forty under 40,” received the Soroptimist Woman of Distinction Award, the Chandler Alliance for Character Award, IMPACT for Enterprising Women Celebration of Success Award, and the Stanford Associates Achievement Award.

It’s quite a resume for a public servant—but right now her attention needs to return to her baby, Miss Micah Rae—and maybe even getting in a short nap.

Extent of human trafficking leads Chandler councilman to help guide statewide initiative vs child predators

The secret is out and the ugly truth is unfortunately confirmed--there is human trafficking in Arizona.

The FBI office recently completed Operation Cross Country, a program to locate sex-traffic victims throughout the U.S.

Nationally, 168 kids were recovered in the sting; five children and 42 adults were recovered in Arizona--all were being victimized through prostitution. The youths, who identified themselves as being from Chandler, Phoenix, Yuma, Tucson, and Mesa, were rescued by the Phoenix FBI office during the last week of June.

The reality that young girls from the Valley are becoming victims to adult predators initially came as shocking news to Chandler Councilmember Jeff Weninger until his wife, Janet, educated him on the topic.

"My wife is actively involved in this cause, and she actually brought it to my attention," said Weninger.

"So, I started checking with the Chandler Police Department to find out if it was an issue here, and to find out if they were aware of how to identify victims."

Of particular concern to Weninger is the involvement and abuse of children.

He says that the problem is bigger than most of the public realize and that children who are the most vulnerable are neglected kids who may live in group homes, in foster care or be in abusive homes.

The predators, or pimps, target this type of child because they can use their weaknesses to trap them and to keep them dependent.

"The average age is 14 for victims being brought into this underground sub-culture," said Weninger.

"Although more victims are being rescued today than just a year ago, there are still very low odds of recovering victims once they are taken. For the victims who are rescued, the most crucial thing we can do is to put them in a safe place where they are no longer in danger of their pimp finding them."

Weninger says that more shelters are needed in the East Valley for the those aged 18 to 24 because these are young adults, too old for foster care but still in danger of becoming homeless or living in an insecure environment.

Once he became more educated on the topic, Weninger said, he interviewed Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery during his edition of the "Chandler In Focus" program, which is seen on government access Channel 11 in Chandler homes.

Montgomery served on Gov. Jan Brewer's Task Force on Human Trafficking that was formed in April 2013.

The end result of the committee's work was House Bill 2454, which was signed into state law and increases penalties to predators for offenses involving underage girls.

In Chandler, besides Weninger, Councilmember Nora Ellen also actively supports organizations that are focused on child abuse and educating the public on sex trafficking.

Weninger is anxious to let the public know about this social problem because he believes that being aware is critical to slowing down its growth in the community.

"There are trainings available for citizens, first responders and for the teen population," said Weninger, "because they are the ones who must be informed if we want to ensure they don't end up as victims."

He added:

"My wife is part of a statewide effort that includes Mesa Community College, Starbright Foundation, Childhelp and a few others who are focused on training our state's youth to avoid predators.

"My wife received a grant from the Arizona Summit on Volunteerism and Service Learning for a project that teens age 13-18 can participate in by creating a short video on the issue that is meant to help their peers become aware of the issue.

Tempe's asst. city manager retires, paving way for staffing changes

New provisions of the Tempe City Code to allow for position-neutral adjustments to the way the city is organized are now in effect following two public hearings and final approval by the City Council on June 26.

Tempe City Manager Andrew Ching proposed the changes, which are expected to be seamless for residents and other external parties.

The new process is comprised of mostly internal adjustments to the city's organizational chart.

"There are many efficiencies to be gained by making these changes," said Ching, who was appointed by the City Council in January 2013.

"From enabling me to focus on the broader, long-term direction of the council to providing a one-stop-shop for human-services needs, these changes will help us serve Tempeans better."

Assistant City Manager Jeff Kulaga, who had held that job for the past 10 years, recently retired, creating an opportunity for Ching to examine the city

organization and, with the City Council's consent, make a number of changes.

The plan does not call for any more or less city employees overall.

Highlights of the plan include creating two deputy city manager positions, in place of a single assistant city manager. Tempe had two deputy managers until several years ago.

One deputy will function as the city's chief financial officer, overseeing a new Municipal Budget office and Internal Services Department. Internal Services will include divisions for Human Resources, Information Technology and Central/Financial Services.

Another deputy will function as the city's chief

operating officer, overseeing the Public Works, Community Development and Community Services departments, along with a newly established Human Services Department.

The new Human Services function will include Social Services (such as counseling, senior services, homeless outreach and Section 8 housing), Diversity, and outreach to veterans and education partners. The department also will work closely with external partners such as Tempe Community Council and Tempe Community Action Agency.

Recruitments for the two deputy positions and for two department head positions (Human Services and Internal Services) are completed, underway or scheduled to begin soon.

City officials say other changes in the Public Works and Community Development departments will create efficiencies in processing permits for all kinds of construction, from major commercial developments to home renovation projects.

14 years in the works, SRP finalizes a massive power project

Tempe and west Chandler residents can worry less about their power going out during the monsoon season, thanks to completion of a major new transmission project that brings added electricity and increased reliability to the area and its Valley-wide neighbors.

Officials at SRP, provider of electricity to 990,000-plus metro-Phoenix customers, announced that the final phase of the Palo Verde-Southeast Valley Browning 500-kilovolt project went on line for the first time in late June.

This marked a major milestone for SRP, which described the project as the last segment of a new 150-mile transmission line that runs from the Palo Verde Nuclear Power Plant area near Tonopah to the Browning substation in east Mesa.

Planning, land acquisition and construction date back more than 14 years, according to John Underhill, SRP's senior director of system operations.

Now that the system is operational, he said, area residents can breathe a bit easier during the summer monsoon season and at other times of the year when outages can occur.

Prior to the PV-SEV line, SRP depended on a single 500kV transmission line to bring energy from the Palo Verde energy hub to the East Valley. The final line segment, which spans 100 miles, is the last component of the PV-SEV 500-kV project that began construction in 2006, after six years of planning,

engineering and required approvals.

"The entire East Valley will benefit," said Underhill. "This new transmission line, which originates in the West Valley, will now bring power all the way around to the east. This provides us with another power source into that area, where few or no generating plants are being built east of the Santan Generating Station."

The project resulted from a study by SRP and other Arizona electric utilities, coupled with review by the Arizona Corporation Commission, showing a need for added transmission capacity to meet increasing energy demands created by business and residential growth in central Arizona and Tucson.

The study concluded that energy deliveries in central Arizona required a new transmission line and other equipment additions, as well as significant upgrades to existing equipment.

"Years of planning and hard work by many entities, including SRP employees and contract personnel, resulted in a quality project that will serve the needs of the customers for many years to come," said Dan Hawkins, senior project manager of Major Transmission Projects for SRP.

The project has included the building of five large substations — Pinal West, Duke, Pinal Central, Abel and Dinosaur — and additions to the existing Hassayampa and Browning substations, Hawkins said. Also as part of the project, two 500/230-kV

transformers at Pinal Central and one 500/230-kV transformer at Duke, located in Pinal County, were energized May 30 and June 12, respectively.

The PW-SEV-BOB project will serve customers in Pinal, Pima and Maricopa counties.

In describing the need for the added capability and the planning that preceded construction, Hawkins likened it to how residents receive water from their city's utility service.

"As in local neighborhoods, the water supply comes in through pipes. As more people move in to those neighborhoods and there is insufficient water in the system, cities add more distribution capability to the old system."

And that, he says, is similar to how SRP addresses geographic spread in the East Valley and elsewhere. While the newly completed project focuses on the needs of increased population growth, it provides additional benefit as well, Hawkins noted.

"This provides an alternative, parallel path to the Palo Verde/Kyrene line, resulting not just in more capacity but in added reliability," Hawkins said.

Senior manager Underhill, who worked with the project since its inception, said the project's completion represents a classic example of entrepreneurial engineering for all those who planned and executed it, including its imprint on the

nearby environment.

“The design and building of the 100-plus-mile system is really remarkable,” he said.

“I received a firsthand aerial view as our staff inspected the line in a helicopter. It’s impressive how we were able to build the line to blend in with the landscape.”

Hawkins was likewise pleased with the project’s outcome, particularly because it should lessen the likelihood of problems connected with failure of the Valley’s electrical network.

“Before this new project, if we ever lost the major line from Palo Verde into our Kyrene substation, there’s a very high probability we would have had a blackout or some brownouts,” he said.

Now, it seems, there’s one less worry for SRP and its nearly 1 million customers to whom electric power has become an unseen—but seldom unavailable—necessity for everyday living in the Valley of the Sun.

Aug. 26 vote for Tempe council openings, propositions

The Primary Election is Tuesday, Aug. 26, for three open positions on the Tempe City Council and four proposed City Charter amendments: Propositions 473, 474, 475 and 476.

There are three open positions on the City Council for terms that begin in January.

The deadline to register to vote is Monday, July 28.

Early voting in person at the two Tempe locations will take place Aug. 4-22 at the Tempe Public Library, 3500 S. Rural Road, and at Arizona State University at the Palo Verde West Building, Room 151, 330 E. University Drive.

The locations are open Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Friday 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

For more information, including details on the charter amendment propositions, candidate contact information and how to find your polling place, visit www.tempe.gov/election.

A publicity pamphlet with information on the propositions, including the sample ballot, will be mailed to all households containing a registered voter the week of July 21.

Important note for early voters — An important note for Tempe voters who are on the county’s permanent early voting list and registered as “Other,” which includes Independent and Party Not Designated: for the first time in a Tempe candidate election, you need to choose between ballot types.

The reason is that a 2012 state law consolidating city and county elections means that, for the first time,

candidates for Tempe City Council — a non-partisan election — will be on the same ballot as Maricopa County’s partisan election.

On May 28, the county mailed postcards to voters registered as “Other,” asking them to choose a city-only nonpartisan ballot or a ballot from one of the four recognized parties (Republican, Democrat, Libertarian or Americans Elect).

This choice is for the Primary Election only.

Choosing the city-only ballot means you will only vote on the City Council candidates and the Charter amendments.

A party-specific ballot means that you will be able to vote on the candidates for that particular party, as well as for the City Council candidates and Charter amendments.

Requesting a party-specific ballot does not equate to a change in a voter’s official registration with the county.

The postcards must be returned by July 12 in order to get an early ballot by mail.

For those who miss the deadline, the county will send second postcards 33 days prior to the Aug. 26 election.

Voters also can select their early ballot preferences through Aug. 15 by calling 602-506-1511 or visiting www.recorder.maricopa.gov.

If you are registered with one of the four recognized parties, you don’t need to take any action — the process has not changed.

Your party ballot will include candidates for your particular party, as well as for the City Council candidates and Charter amendments.

New fireworks rules OK local use

Certain fireworks are now legal to buy and use until July 6 for Arizona counties with a population of more than 500,000.

The passage of SB 1158, legislation signed by Gov. Brewer in late April, puts stipulations on the fireworks residents may use.

The bill also includes the following dates regulating the purchase or use of fireworks:

Residents may legally purchase fireworks May 20 - July 6 and Dec.

23 - Jan. 3. Residents may legally use fireworks June 24 - July 6 and Dec. 24 - Jan. 3.

Approved are ground spinners, sparking-wheel devices and fountain shaped fireworks June 24 - July 6.

Sparklers and snap caps are permitted year-round.

Firecrackers, aerial spinners, mine devices and aerial shell kits are not permitted because of their ability to detonate in the air.

Corona football and basketball fans might get to see one of their alumni compete at Sun Devil stadium with a pitchfork on his uniform as opposed to that of a visiting team if Arizona State football head coach Todd Graham has his way.

Cassius Peat, the third son from the Todd Peat family's to be offered a chance to stay home and play in front of the hometown crowd, has put ASU on his short list of six top teams to choose from.

Peat, at 6-foot-4, 230 pounds, received 15 offers from colleges, including his first scholarship offer in June 2013, from the Sun Devils. Since then he has been offered football scholarships from 15 Division I universities including Notre Dame, Utah, Boston College, Vanderbilt, Michigan and six other Pac-12 schools.

With his size and quickness, the multi-talented Peat, recruited to play linebacker, tight end and defensive end, has narrowed his choices to Arizona

State, Oregon, Oklahoma, Michigan State, UCLA and Texas A&M.

"Great coaching staffs and great football programs is what attracted me to these six universities," said Peat. "I've been training hard this summer to have a big year and hope to make my final

"New head coach **Cory Nenaber** has put together a great staff at Corona and we are looking forward to turning the program around," said Peat.

Just because Pete chose to pursue football instead of a basketball scholarship at the next level, doesn't mean he's giving up basketball his senior year.

Pete, a key member of the Aztecs' three straight Division I state championship basketball teams, will be shooting for his fourth championship ring once football is over this fall.

"Our goal is to win our fourth straight championship title this year," said Peat. "We won't settle for anything less."



Navigating life: No instruction manual included Pilates guru stretches bodies, minds to promote health

To lead a long, happy, healthy life is one of man's ultimate objectives. But no one said it was going to be easy, and no one said you had to figure it out alone.

That's the philosophy of Pilates Tempe owner Kris Zahn.

"My favorite saying around here is that we weren't born with an instruction manual," Zahn said. "We teach you to understand how to use the body that you were born into correctly when you step outside of this building."

Although Zahn dedicates her life to helping others develop, maintain or rehabilitate through Pilates and other exercises, she was not aware of the exercise strategy until later in her career.

"I've been involved with sports and exercise my entire life," Zahn said.

In her earlier years, Zahn was extremely active, always seeking the next sport to participate and compete in.

"I chose to bowl professionally as my career in '74 and loved every second of it," Zahn said. "It wasn't high income producing but I got the chance to travel the world and meet lots and lots of people."

"I wouldn't trade it for all the money in the world. It was the best experience."

During her bowling career, Zahn also contributed to the color commentary on ESPN for the ladies pro bowlers broadcast and owned and operated a bowling center on Apache Boulevard with her former husband.

Although she retired professionally in '95, Zahn went on to become national director of high school bowling for five years.



"I traveled all around the country creating high school bowling programs," Zahn said. "I was able to help the kids that never got the chance to participate in other high school sports and helped them produce better grades in their classes. It was the most rewarding part of my life."

After an eye-opening experience at a week-long stay in Canyon Ranch, where Zahn found herself assisting the exercise class, she knew exactly what her next move would be.

"I was looking for something else to do. I was tired of traveling (she started hitting the road in 1971 and didn't stop until 2005), and I couldn't believe how much I enjoyed helping out," Zahn said. "I knew I wanted to be a trainer right then and there."

Although Zahn remained committed to operation of the bowling center, eventually her ideas started to fall into place.

"In 2008 I was working out at this Pilates studio off Kyrene, and one day the owner just walked away and left everything," Zahn said. Shortly afterward, she says, "I was driving by and decided to contact the owner of the complex. I explained to him that I wanted to reopen and he was absolutely thrilled because he thought I was just there to complain. That's how we got started. When it's time for things to happen, the universe sends you stuff—it's amazing."

After three years in the original location, Zahn sought an opportunity to move the studio near Warner road.

"Once we moved in, the bigger space next to our studio stayed empty the entire time," Zahn said. "I would walk by this space and say, 'I really wish I could have this.' Then one day the owner and I got together and discussed some options. It turned out to be a fantastic situation for both of us, and I was given the chance to build it from scratch."

Zahn, with the supportive input from her teachers, clients, family and friends, was able to design the entire studio from scratch when she moved into the studio in November.

The expansion and recently remodeled design has provided a new excitement for the Pilates Tempe community, according to those who now frequent it.

In addition to the warm, welcoming environment, Zahn has 13 "reformer" machines to work with.

It is a large machine that, unlike the mat, allows the body to maximize stretching. Mat-only Pilates is more

common because it's inexpensive and takes up less space.

"I always provide a free personal consultation so that people will discover what Pilates is all about," Zahn said. "Most people are not aware and I want them to be able to feel it and know what it's really like."

"It's just becoming something that's all the rage so a majority of people think Pilates is only mat work. They don't realize there is a machine called the reformer, and it surprises them. They don't realize you can spend practically 65 percent of the time on your back doing extremely challenging exercises for every single part of the body. There are so many benefits."

Zahn notes the successful, peaceful camaraderie is due primarily to her teachers and clients.

"It truly is a fantastic community full of wonderful people here and I am so very grateful," Zahn said. "We have the best teachers and clients and we are luckily all on the same page. At this studio, we don't have instructors, we have teachers. You learn about your body and you're going to learn things that you never knew existed. We make sure our clients are learning and understanding the parts of the body that they are using during the exercises. So often we don't properly use the right muscles so we make the job much harder on ourselves."

Zahn is not the only firm believer in the practice. Chiropractors and physical therapists are now encouraging patients to turn to Pilates as a long-term solution.

Through stretching and strengthening, Pilates connects your mind and body and teaches you how

to use the muscles that you have and the proper way their supposed to be used.

A few benefits to Pilates include the elongation and stretching of the spine to avoid lower back pain, strengthens your muscles, creates endless flexibility, helps with breathing, gives you more energy, works your feet muscles, helps with balance and you can combine with any other work out.

"We don't call it fat, we call it extra energy waiting to be used," Zahn jokes. "We try to avoid using the F-word around here. Pilates not only gives you energy but it helps burn that extra energy as well."

The exercise is not gender-specific in the slightest, Zahn notes.

"Guys really need to take a closer look into this," Zahn said. "Everyone thinks this is only for gals, but I have so many guys here because they are starting to realize that not being able to bend over and touch the floor is a bad thing. As you age, we get tighter and the flexibility goes away. The stretching and strengthening is what you do in a Pilates work out, and it's what will help your body immensely."

She firmly believes everyone should try it. "I want everyone to be able to experience Pilates so I try to make it as affordable as possible," Zahn said. "I have set up my business model so that people don't have to sign contracts so they are able to come and go as they need."

Currently 12 teachers strong hosting 86 classes per week, Zahn's goal is to remain an intimate studio with an even greater array of classes to accommodate more people.

It's an exercise that you can take with you forever, Zahn explains.

"The challenge is making that commitment to yourself to take that hour each day to come in here and do whatever it is you need to do with yourself, to forget work, to forget having to do the laundry or

the grocery shopping, forget the boss screaming at you, all that sort of stuff," Zahn said. "We joke that you must leave all of your problems in the parking lot, and then when you leave you drive over them and never pick them up."

The welcoming community is beneficial for all.

"We laugh a lot around here, we joke, and it's just a really great environment overall. I'm so blessed to have everyone here that I do. It took me so long to realize, 'oh my gosh this is us' and I'm so proud of it."

Zahn's passion is evident.

"I enjoy helping people that are broken. I know a lot of people come in to work out and be healthy and to look good, but there are just as many around here that have a broken part," Zahn said. "Whether it's their knees, their shoulders, back or something else, they come in here and spend a month and start to feel better. The change I see and hear, that's my favorite part of all."

So. Tempe man shares his passion for no-kill shelters

Aug. 16 film showing is designed to raise awareness of how movement has gained strength in Maricopa County, elsewhere

Editor's note: South Tempe resident Edward Bufford is sharing with a Valleywide audience his passion for saving the lives of animals, hoping that others who support the no-kill movement will be motivated to take a more active role.

The goal of the movement, says Bufford, is to increase efforts to save the lives of animals in Maricopa County shelters.

One way of developing greater awareness of the program, he says, is through the showing of a film chronicling the development of the animal protection movement in the United States.

According to Bufford, No Kill Maricopa County, the non-profit organization that is presenting the film, wants to reach as many animal-loving Maricopa County residents as possible.

"It is important for the public to know that, in the last decade and a half, animal shelters in many communities have implemented a bold series of programs and services to reduce birthrates, increase adoptions, and keep animals with their responsible caretakers."

As a result, says Bufford, unprecedented results are being achieved. The lives of as many as 95 percent of all impounded animals have been saved since the start of the group's initiative. So far, he says, 250 communities, which represent between 300 and 500 cities and towns, have No Kill standards, and that number continues to grow.

No Kill Maricopa County will offer a screening of "Redemption," a documentary film by Nathan Winograd, the founder of the No Kill movement in America, at 5 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 16, at the downtown Phoenix Theatre.

Information and tickets, at \$5, are available online at <http://bit.ly/Q9Yk6B> and at the theater box office.

Following the documentary, there will be a discussion of the current status of the No Kill Movement.

Bufford says that, starting with the North American founding of the first Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, or SPCA, by Henry Bergh and continuing to this day, the film is a story of betrayal, hope and redemption as told by volunteers, elected officials and shelter staff who are saving lives.

Most of all, says Bufford, it is the story of a social movement "that is as noble and just" as those which have come before.

"When the early founders of the animal protection movement died, their zeal was replaced with an ember that gave little light or warmth, and the humane movement went to sleep," he said. "After over 100 years of this antiquated and deadly paradigm, the grassroots of the animal protection movement is finally waking up."

Of the communities that have taken action, little is shared demographically. What the communities do share, Bufford says, is shelter leadership with a passion for lifesaving and a dedication to comprehensively implementing a key series of programs and services, collectively referred to as the "No Kill Equation." Once the emphasis is placed on saving all animals except those that are very sick and those with behavioral issues that are unresponsive to rehabilitation, and once shelter leaders stop blaming the public, pet overpopulation, and a lack of resources, the unnecessary killing of animals has been shown to stop, according to Bufford.

Now, animals are entering No Kill shelters and, even though resources are limited, the movement is succeeding.

The fundamental lesson from the experiences of these communities is that the choices made by shelter leaders are the most significant variables in whether animals live or die.

Several communities are more than doubling adoptions and cutting killing by as much as 75 percent, and it isn't taking them five years or more to do it. Some are doing it virtually overnight. Studies show that, when members of the public learn that their shelter is a No Kill facility, the number of foster caretakers and volunteers increases dramatically.

In Nevada, Bufford says, the Humane Society of Washoe County went from 50 volunteers to 10,000 once it became a No Kill shelter.

"In our community, it is time for change," Bufford says. "We have an unprecedented opportunity for a new beginning. Our citizens are kind, caring and generous.

"If you love animals, you will want to see "Redemption" and the presentation that follows to learn more about what can be done to save more lives."

Shelter killing is the leading cause of death for healthy dogs and cats in the United States.

Corona's Basketball Team — Although the Arizona Division I state championship tournament is months and games away, where anything can happen, the possibility of Corona winning a fourth straight basketball championship was one of the main topics of conversation during basketball tournaments earlier this summer.

Corona recently played in the Prime Time tournament at Tempe High School June 19-21, easily defeating all opponents out of the eight participating Arizona teams that crossed their path.

What had everyone talking, though, was the 82-49 crushing defeat the Aztecs handed Scottsdale Chaparral in the championship game.

Corona started the game shooting lights out with the Firebirds wondering what hit them after senior wing **Dane Kuiper** and sophomore guard **Alex Barcello** drained one basket after another, including several 3-pointers, to take a 58-29 lead at halftime.

Kuiper, who shot 100 percent during the first half, and Barcello, who missed only one shot, combined to make 41 of the Aztecs' 58 first half points.

Corona displayed solid defense, in addition

coach **Sammy Duane Jr.** stopped the bleeding by emptying his bench with 12 minutes to play.

Barcello, who is slated to replace 4-year starter **Casey Benson**, appears to have made a statement this summer about his basketball talent and was named MVP of the tournament

The Aztecs completed their summer schedule by competing in the 8th Annual Best in Basketball Summer Invitational June 26-29 at Tempe High.

Duane divided his team into two separate squads so that everyone had a chance to play and be evaluated by the coaching staff.

"This tournament gave us a chance to look at a lot of guys and put players in different roles to see how they handled things during the stress of game situations," said Duane.

Corona went 3-1 during the tournament, losing by 12 points to Regis Jesuit out of Colorado.

"All of our guys played well during the weekend," said Duane, "but **Tyrell Henderson** had a big play that won the last game."

"Tyrell made a 4-point play with four seconds left in our game against Tempe when we were losing by three points," said Duane. "He was fouled shooting a last second attempt and not only made his 3-pointer but also drained his foul shot to put us up by one point to win the game."

In addition to Kuiper and Barcello, the Aztecs will have fourth year varsity player **Cassius Peat**, who not only has a strong presence in the paint but can be counted on to rebound, hold his own on defense against bigger players and make inside shots.

Defense and rebounding will be key to winning games, according to Duane, but Corona will be relying on guard **Isaiah Bolden** to help Henderson, Kuiper and Barcello in the transition game.

The youngest but tallest member of Corona's team may be 6-foot-9 incoming freshman **Marvin Bagley** who is reputed to be beyond his years in shot-blocking, dunking and basketball skills.

All in all, Duane is happy with what he saw from his team this summer and has a good idea about what they will need to work on next fall.

"We know we will be very competitive next year," said Duane. "As the season gets closer to starting in November, we will need to focus on defending and rebounding which will be key to getting our transition game going."

Corona Duo Competes at Brooks PR Invitational in Seattle — **Tevin Mayfield** and **Nathan Rodriguez** spent three days competing at

the Brooks PR Invitational in Seattle, where Mayfield took third in the 110 meter hurdles and Rodriguez 12th in the mile on June 21.


Mayfield, who ran 14.02 to win the Division I state title in this same even in May, ran the event in 14.10 at the Brooks PR.

"I felt extremely good and really bouncy before my race at the Brooks PR," said Mayfield. "It was the first time that I felt good before a race in a long time and I knew if I got out of the blocks with the leaders, I could compete with anyone."

Although it was not Mayfield's personal best time in this event, it was his second fastest time all season. It also was fast enough to help him meet his goal of finishing in the top three.

"It was one of the greatest three days I've ever had," said Mayfield. "It felt great to run fast enough against quality runners to grab third place and bring home a medal."

The same could not be said for Rodriguez, who raced under pressure in so many events his senior year in high school and played a big role in helping Corona win the boys state championship track team title by winning not only the 1600, 3200 and 800 meter races at state but was part of the Aztecs' championship 4x800 meter relay team.

"I went into the Brooks PR very physically in tune and ready to race, but I think the mental aspect is what caused me to not perform as well as I had hoped," said Rodriguez. "I became nervous before racing with the nation's best high-caliber runners and that may have hindered my performance throughout the race."

Rodriguez ran the mile in 4:15.85, or more than 5 seconds longer than his personal best time all season of 4:10.46.

"I had a lot of good races this year where I performed very well," said Rodriguez. "I just had a bad day. I hope to learn from my mistakes and take the knowledge I gained from this experience and build upon it at the next level for my college races next year."

Diversions . . . with M.V. Moorhead

Sci-fi leads the genres in latest array of summer film offerings

Summertime tends to be sci-fi time at the American movies, and so far this summer is no exception.

Opening July 4:

Earth to Echo—Three preteen friends are about to be separated by the eminent domain destruction of their Nevada subdivision. They decide to have one more big adventure together, so they ride their bikes out to the middle of the desert, tracking a digital signal, and there find a cute little cybernetic alien, apparently marooned.

They dub him Echo and quickly figure out how to communicate with him. Soon, joined by a pretty girl they like, they're helping Echo gather parts to repair himself and return to his spaceship.

The movie is a collection of motifs from '80s kids' fantasy/adventure movies—most obviously *E.T.*, both in its storyline and in certain visual nods, like the creepy, amorphous mob of human researchers chasing the boys, flashlights in hand.

But there are also hints of *The Goonies*, *Explorers*, maybe even *Stand By Me*, and Echo looks a bit like Bubo the clockwork owl in the original *Clash of the Titans*. This gives the film a pleasing throwback quality, and the young leads create a likable sense of loyalty to each other.

Snowpiercer—This one begins with the release of a cooling agent, something like "Ice Nine" in Vonnegut's *Cat's Cradle*, to combat global warming. The world immediately freezes and, according to the opening exposition, "all life became extinct." This would be rather anticlimactic, so the movie contradicts itself at once: A remnant of society remains, riding a futuristic supertrain in a constant, annual loop around the snowbound earth.

The train's "Tail Section" houses the ragged underclass, kept in check by armed guards and fed on nasty-looking cubes of protein gel. A band of revolutionaries led by Curtis (Chris Evans) and a wizened

old sage, Gilliam (John Hurt) makes a charge toward the front of the train, where the first-class passengers live in decadent luxury. Once past the more brutal and unsavory security forces, each car along the way is increasingly swanky and bizarre—the revolutionaries storm aquariums, sushi bars,

schoolhouses, beauty salons and discos. Central to the plot are such initially baffling elements as hard-boiled eggs, tape measures and apparently the last two cigarettes in the world.

Based on a French comic book (*Le Transperceniege*), this is the work of Bong Joon-ho, the brilliant Korean who made *The Host*. For a while I couldn't decide if *Snowpiercer* was the silliest piece of camp in years or the most blisteringly profound allegory for modern society since Hobbes' *Leviathan*, but after a while I realized that I didn't have to choose—either way, the movie is never boring.

The cast is superb—it includes Jamie Bell, Ed Harris, Song Kang-ho and Ah-sung Ko (both from *The Host*), Octavia Spencer, Alison Pill and, best of all, Tilda Swinton, hilarious as a toadying minor official. The design of the train is a series of nutty surprises, and the music, by Marco Beltrami, is stirring. *Snowpiercer* is savagely violent at times, and has episodes that fall flat, but overall it's one of the strangest and most fascinating sci-fi movies to come down the track in a long time.

childhood, I don't have the sentimental attachment to them that boys who were kids in the '80s do. And the first two big-budget *Transformers* blockbusters starred Shia LeBeouf, whose appeal, I'm afraid, was lost on me. So those films left me cold.

But this new sequel features robotic dinosaurs, and I've always been partial to dinosaurs. And instead of LeBeouf in the male lead, it features Mark

Wahlberg, who I also like (though not as much as I like dinosaurs). So I was prepared to like this movie.

Well, it has some splendid otherworldly spectacle. The director, Michael Bay, doesn't seem to have an ounce of restraint in his personality, but he is able to stage scenes in which robotic giants amble nonchalantly through settings of burnished Americana, as if Isaac Asimov's imagination had somehow invaded the vision of Norman Rockwell, and this stuff is executed seamlessly by the special effects team.

All that said, this move is dumb, and so outrageously overlong that it feels, somehow, like

an act of aggression. It's nearly three hours long. It's almost an hour longer than *Citizen Kane*. It's more than an hour longer than *Casablanca*. And you don't even get to see the robot dinosaurs until near the end. If you really want to see it, wait for the DVD.

Earth to Echo is rated PG and *Transformers: Age of Extinction* is rated PG-13. Both play at Harkins Arizona Mills, Tempe Marketplace and Chandler Fashion 20, and other multiplexes Valleywide. *Snowpiercer* is rated R and plays at Harkins Shea.




