

Cover story: Revitalizing Downtown Chandler New vision for 'The DC'

Two new arrivals have teamed up in Chandler, and their focus is "The DC" — Downtown Chandler, that is.

Wrangler News caught up with this dynamic duo at one of their favorite meeting locations, Yoli's Cafe, in the heart of The DC, to dish about their newfound turf and plans for its future.

Kim Moyers, the city's downtown redevelopment manager since April, and Jeff Kulaga, executive director of the Downtown Chandler Community Partnership since July, work together from their respective positions to advance the development of this burgeoning retail, shopping and governmental enclave.

Downtown Chandler is the area bordered by Chandler Boulevard to the north, Frye Road to the south, Delaware Street to the east and Dakota, California and Oregon streets to the west.

This area has changed considerably since Dr. A.J. Chandler founded the community in 1912, when "downtown" consisted of a modest townsite office, a dining hall, a small grocery store and a billboard posted at the site of a soon-to-be-built luxury resort in the desert—what was then and remains today the Hotel San Marcos.

Inspired by a rich history and

unique architecture, the DC has become a popular place for Chandler, Tempe and other neighboring residents to experience a variety of food and drink offerings, boutique shops, galleries, nightlife and a year-round calendar of events and entertainment—"All near ample free parking," notes Kulaga.

"Surface parking, off-street parking and three public parking garages are available, and, yes, they're all free." (A convenient parking map can be downloaded at www.downtownchandler.org).

With inspiration from Chandler's past, the city's goal is to create and maintain a vibrant downtown that attracts the diverse and high-tech community of today.

As a 501 (c) 6 organization, the DCCP organization supports that effort with marketing, promotion, safety, and beautification of the downtown areas.

"I'm a public works guy that gets excited about well-maintained flowers and streetscapes," admits Kulaga.

"The City Council has done a good job investing in the downtown, and it will continue to grow and expand," said Kulaga.

Moyers and Kulaga meet frequently to review development plans and progress of The DC. "There's no question Downtown Chandler is an attractive and safe place to work, play, and eat," Kulaga emphasizes.

“And soon, the place to live, too,” Moyers adds— noting residential townhomes have recently been completed and additional residential development sites are planned in and around The DC.

Whether longtime residents or new neighbors and visitors, Moyers and Kulaga issue a joint invitation for folks to see what The DC has to offer. Visitors can enjoy a local brew or glass of wine, peruse one-of-a-kind shops, view arts and entertainment, satisfy the taste buds, golf at the newly renovated San Marcos course (re-opening in November).

Simply stated, there’s something for everyone just down the street.

“Downtown Chandler gives us a place everybody can gather, and feel a sense of community,” said Moyers.

“Stop by downtown Chandler, we’re going to surprise you,” assures Kulaga.

Kyrene finances show stability despite shortfall in state funding

During the past five years, the Kyrene School district withstood a tough roller coaster ride financially, due in large part to a shortfall in promised funding from the state legislature, said Jeremy Calles, Kyrene's chief financial officer.

Calles explained to the district's Governing Board that, in a recent ruling by the Arizona Supreme Court, it was decided the state failed to deliver adequate funds to schools.

But the issue is still under debate to determine how much the state actually owes to make up the funding deficit.

A lawsuit filed by school districts is seeking funds for two issues: an increase in the base level of student spending and back payments for unfunded inflation since Fiscal Year 2009.

It was in that year, said Calles, that Arizona's revenue plunged dramatically due to the recession, and every school district in the state felt the pinch because the base level of student

funding was frozen.

"The freeze is contrary to the public's wishes.

In a previous election, in November 2000, voters approved Proposition 301, which requires an annual adjustment by the state legislature in the amount of K-12 funding per student," said Calles.

"This funding serves as the starting point for computing the dollars distributed to Arizona public schools, which was calculated in FY 2013-14 as \$3,327 per student at the base level.

For the current FY, the base is \$3,373; for Kyrene's enrollment it should be \$3,691."

The amount with which Arizona's school districts pay salaries and expenses is called "maintenance and operations, or M&O, funding.

The amount of M&O funds that a school district receives in a given year is determined by a statutory formula, which involves multiplying the number of students who attend each district by a dollar figure known as the base level.

The result of that calculation is the M&O funding.

With the shortage in state funding, the financial road became bumpy for the district and led to a series of cuts from the Kyrene budget that included staff, programs and other resources, Calles said.

"It was a painful process for everyone to go through," recalled Calles. "If we had received the funding we expected from the state, we would not have had to reduce spending as much."

The Governing Board determined that some programs should not be eliminated in spite of the shortfall, such as full-day kindergarten, and, so; the district began dipping into their reserves.

Calles and other staff developed budget balancing strategies to maintain the district's top priorities for students, including no increase in class sizes.

"While we are starting to see a light at the end of the tunnel, we are not there yet," said Calles.

"If this lawsuit is resolved, we hope to see the base student-level funding up to where it should be for this fiscal year."

In spite of the difficult fiscal choices, Calles reported that the district maintained the highest financial rating possible and has an appropriate level of reserve funding at \$15 million.

"We did spend down some of our reserves, but we preserved enough to maintain our strong credit rating," said Calles.

As for receiving back funding, Calles is doubtful the state's legislators will make good on those dollars.

But with the lawsuit between the districts and legislators in appeal, he hopes that the Supreme Court ruling sends a strong message to legislators that they must comply with Proposition 301 and annually adjust for inflation the per student funding paid to districts.

GoDaddy's new Tempe campus a model for employee amenities

Understanding Tempe's traffic signals

If you drive at (or just below) the speed limit down Rural Road, or most any major arterial street in Tempe, most of the time you can count on hitting green lights from one end of the city to the other.

Ever wonder how that works? An innovative, high-tech communications system helps make it happen.

Tempe, which operates and maintains more than 200 traffic signals throughout the city, was recently honored by the Intelligent Transportation Society of Arizona for a new wireless communications project that includes 22 closed-circuit television cameras and 36 wireless radios.

The devices were installed at major arterial crossings as part of the new, state-of-the-art communications system that helps improve traffic flow,

reduce congestion and save money.

Until recently, Tempe relied almost exclusively on what was considered an outdated network of communication lines leased from local utility companies to operate its signal system, which includes highway interchanges, light rail, pedestrian, fire station and HAWK pedestrian hybrid beacon signals.

With completion of the project in June, more than half of the city's signalized intersections are now linked through high-speed wireless connections.

The new system allows the city's traffic engineers to monitor and adjust signals as needed from Tempe's Transportation Management Center in downtown Tempe, meaning smoother traffic flow and reduced congestion for residents, commuters and visitors.



Kyrene boy follows his dream to become music, choir director

As a nine-year-old student at Mariposa Elementary in Tempe, Albert Lee was encouraged by his teacher to audition with the Phoenix Boys Choir. He was accepted and began singing with the choir in 1997.

At that age, he didn't imagine his career would return him to his roots—both as a Kyrene music teacher and as the training choir director for the Phoenix Boys Choir, where he teaches boys aged seven to nine.

"My elementary music teacher, Jennifer Kilgard, introduced the Phoenix Boys Choir to me through a brochure," recalls Lee, "and I ran

home excited to tell my mom about this opportunity and my strong desire to join the organization."

His mother shares Lee's devotion to music.

"I can't describe my family as musical, but my mom has a love of music. She always wanted to take piano lessons, but her parents couldn't afford it at the time, so she ended up passing on that passion to me and my older brother.

"Mom also likes to sing and she was very excited to have me join the Boys Choir when I talked about it with her," said Lee.

His time with the Phoenix Boys Choir was instrumental to his professional development.

"The choir became my introduction to discipline, musicianship, and passion. Singing was still fun, but it also became a form of expression that allowed me to communicate and touch other people's lives."

Lee went on to attend Pueblo Middle School and graduated from Corona del Sol High School in 2006. Then, he continued his education at NAU in Flagstaff, where he earned two degrees in 2012—one in choral music education and the other in piano performance.

He is now in his third year as a chorus teacher at Kyrene Akimel A-al Middle School. He made the decision to become a teacher after student teaching at Desert Vista High School in Phoenix.

"When I received positive energy from those high-school students, it was the first time I learned my capability as a leader and my ability to impact students' lives," said Lee. "This encouraged my decision to continue

pursuing a teaching career. From then on, it has been a journey, but a wonderful one that has taught me so much!"

As a new teacher, Lee is enjoying observing his students' reaction to learning about their own talents.

"The best part of working with youth is

seeing them grow and progress. Every improvement and every success I have, with my private students or with a class, excites me because it's a positive sign that my students are growing.

"It gets even better when the student realizes their own growth and success, and that only gets both of us more excited for what's to come in the future."

Lee retains his personal desire to perform and improve his own musical abilities, so he continues to take voice lessons under two coaches to study classical literature, vocal anatomy and performance expression. He also is a member of the Master's Choir, which is the adult ensemble with the Phoenix Boys Choir.

In his work with youth, he hopes to pass along his enthusiasm for music education and he also enjoys sharing some of his personal philosophy with his students.

"Along with the many musical concepts and knowledge I teach to them, I hope to encourage my students to use their personal gifts, both musical and non-musical, to inspire and make a positive difference in other people's lives."



Forums help solve the mysteries of college financing

It's Saturday morning. Imagine a space filled with high school students, some coming from football or cheer practice, others simply deciding not to sleep in.

They join a roomful of parents, all with the same goal: better understanding the labyrinth of leaps and hurdles needed to plan for college and careers.

Given the challenges of understanding high school pre-requisites and admissions requirements, various tuition costs and fees, financial aid, class options and degree choices, unclear timelines and sometimes a lack of family support, many high school students don't see college as a reality.

Knowing where to start, identifying accurate information, finding resources and navigating through the processes can be confusing and frustrating, say many.

Thanks to grants from the Tempe Diablos and the Ramsey Social Justice Foundation, members of the Tempe City Council, city staff and high school counselors have partnered with Mesa Community College, Rio Salado College, the University of Advancing Technology, Grand Canyon College and Arizona State University to "L.I.F.T." students and sharpen their focus toward college.

L.I.F.T.—Learn, Investigate, Fund and Transition—the way to college is the collective objective in these hands-on and

interactive workshops.

According to Tempe councilmember Robin Arredondo-Savage, who helped spearhead the initiative, "Navigating the twists and turns of the pre-college roadmap can be a daunting challenge."

After serving on the Tempe Union High School District Governing Board, as well as participating in numerous scholarship application processes and knowing the ratio of high school counselors to students exceeds 400 to 1, Arredondo-Savage says she saw the need to provide students and parents with clearer resources and information.

For several years, Arredondo-Savage worked with former long-time TUHSD Governing Board member Zita Johnson and others to assemble a team of education partners and bring together the resources to offer services, provide information, answer individual questions, help generate enthusiasm and give high school students an opportunity to get engaged and better informed to reach the next level in college and career pursuits.

"Educating our community is what employers are looking for," said Arredondo-Savage. "and we all want the same thing."

"It was refreshing to see a room filled with young people excited and engaged to learn about college, and to see stakeholders and parents engaged, with so many people

wanting to contribute," said college student and community member Jevin Hodge

Hodge's mom, Berdetta Hodge, also attended the workshop with her high school age son, Jazin, and observed that the students seemed to be empowered by their participation.

It isn't necessary to have participated in the previous workshops to attend upcoming workshops Nov. 1 and Jan. 31 at Tempe Public Library.

STEM instruction gets a boost

Program offers kids a hands-on preview of engineering concepts

Fall classes are back in session, but a select group of budding young engineers won't soon forget what they learned this summer.

Hands-on lessons on how to program a computer, create a video game—even build a robot—were part of the summer curriculum offered by East Valley Engineering for Kids, a program designed to give children ages 4 to 14 a chance to understand the basic concepts of engineering.

The course focused its lessons on science, technology, engineering and math knowledge, commonly referred to as STEM, a concept identified by educator Dori Roberts as being in short supply in classrooms around the country.

Roberts evolved the curriculum into the Engineering for Kids concept in 2009 and, based on its success, created a franchise business, which is now found in 26 states and four countries.

The goal of STEM instruction is to provide a vehicle for students to prepare for college degrees and jobs of the future, according to Roberts. Classes, she says, teach

kids important concepts that encourage innovation and creativity.

In Arizona, Ron Hoagland purchased the first franchise serving Tempe, Chandler and Ahwatukee families. For this year's summer camps, Engineering for Kids partnered with the Primavera Blended Learning Center to use Primavera's new facility at 2451 N. Arizona Ave., which opened earlier this year.

The vice president of operations at Primavera, Dominick Sirianni, says he has been so impressed with the Engineering for Kids program that his eight-year-old son, Connor, attended the two-week camp.

Local franchise holder Hoagland also noted that East Valley Engineering for Kids plans to offer STEM-based robotics and video-game design at after-school programs for kids 4-14 at Bright Beginnings School in Chandler and at other locations across the Valley.

Connor, who will be a third grader at Ward Traditional Academy in Tempe, says that his time at this year's summer camp was awesome.

"I love the video game Minecraft and wanted to learn

more about programming. In the first week, I was learning how to design levels and characters using backgrounds and platforms, and making sure it's all active," said Connor.

Another lesson was on the engineering of energy. "I built a water wheel and a windmill," said an enthusiastic Connor.

"In the afternoon we built Lego Robotix and had a battle."

Connor said he learned lots at the camp and made friends, too. His teachers all made the classes fun.

Franchisee Hoagland says he's pleased to be able to use the state-of-the-art Primavera facility for the summer camps. He says kids are natural engineers and have a great curiosity about how things work.

"Our goal at Engineering for Kids is to introduce concepts to children that will spark a passion for engineering, math and science."

Versatile string quartet brings ominous Halloween repertoire to history museum

The usual Halloween haunts are fine, but why not try some fright with a bit of refinement? Those with a taste for classical composition or a tendency to faint when spooked might enjoy the Halloween program of accomplished local chamber ensemble Tetra String Quartet, performing Oct. 24 at the Tempe History Museum.

In what is becoming an annual tradition, violist Louis Privitera said the quartet's previous Halloween performances at THM included an arrangement of Michael Jackson's "Thriller" and accompanying video of B-movie horror clips. This year attendees can expect some brooding Beethoven works in addition to some "seasonal treats," he said.

The unique quartet consists entirely of Arizona State alumni that now serve as faculty associates in the music department. Privitera, violinists Heidi Wright and Chrystal Smothers, as well as cellist Jenna Dalbey, chose not to pursue the usual path taken by classical musicians: cutthroat auditions for orchestra and academic positions.

Instead, Privitera said, they wanted to own their artistry and find opportunities to make meaningful connections with communities. Now in its fifth season of local residencies and international touring, Tetra united in 2009 around the shared goal of infusing performance with education and public service.

"We wanted to do more than typical orchestral concerts," Privitera said. "We wanted to have ownership of our careers, a true say in the direction we took."

Tetra holds a number of residencies around the state, where they immerse themselves in a given program, offer classes and clinics and organize performances. Among these programs is the group's immersion with the orchestra classes at Marcos de Niza and Tempe high schools teaching fundamentals of chamber music.


The group's program at Marcos aims to teach students, through chamber music, the elements of CAMP: Communication, Awareness, Musicianship and Personal Responsibility. The program ends with a culmination concert at the



Frightful fare for Halloween

Dracula Untold

It's hard to believe that there are any versions of the Dracula myth that remain untold. There have been earlier origin stories—the slightly underrated *Dracula 2000* offered a particularly audacious and amusing one, for instance.

But this may just be the first *Dracula* movie to suggest that the Count embraced vampirism in a spirit of noble self-sacrifice.

Set in the 1400s, *Dracula Untold* depicts Vlad Dracula, played by the pleasantly studly Welshman Luke Evans, as a gallant warrior-prince who loves his waiflike wife (Sarah Gadon) and his stouthearted son (Art Parkinson).

Sure, he used to be called “Vlad the Impaler” for his treatment of his

Tempe History Museum, which “gets [students] in a public space that’s not just their school auditorium,” Privitera said.

Tetra also maintains a versatile residency as part of the Musical Instrument Museum’s educational series, performing material for visiting students varying from legendary Italian composers to Beatles arrangements.

Tetra’s commitment to the community immersion reaches even further than the classroom. The group currently holds a residency at Friendship Village, a Tempe retirement home, where Privitera takes particular joy in playing for Alzheimer’s patients.

After playing for inmates at a Texas prison in 2011, the group is considering developing a program for juvenile detention and rehab facilities.

Privitera’s favorite residency is with the Nogales-based Youth

Audiences in Santa Cruz County, where the group performs for underserved students that rarely get to see any kind of classical performance. “That’s always something we feel blessed to do,” he said. “It’s our mission 10-fold getting to do that.”

Their efforts have also earned them quite a few sky miles.

As part of Tempe’s Sister Cities cultural exchange program, the group flew to Cuenca, Ecuador, in 2012 for a 10-day concert tour. They were also invited guests at the Saarburg International Music Festival in Germany.

Privitera said musicians in the classical realm should strive to stay relevant to contemporary audiences. Performances like the Halloween program are part of Tetra’s effort to be entrepreneurial in creating its own niche and giving audiences a fresh take on chamber music.

“We know what we’re good at and we’re going to make a market for it,” he said.

enemies, but now he just wants to protect his beloved Transylvania from the Ottoman Turks, by whom he was enslaved as a Janissary when he was a boy.

He's a reformed impaler, we assume.

When the Turks show up at his castle, in the middle of Easter dinner no less, demanding, along with their usual monetary tribute, a new legion of boy slaves including Vlad's own son, the Prince takes to a mountain cave where he once had an encounter with an ancient, desiccated vampire (Charles Dance).

This old fiend gives him vampiric powers sufficient to bedevil the Turks, and if he can refrain from slaking his thirst for blood for three days, he'll become human again, no harm no foul.

Everything goes smoothly. Vlad, family and country live happily ever after.

Just kidding. All manner of melodrama ensues. It's about as historically convincing as a Ren Faire, but then, unlike life probably was in actual medieval times, Ren Faires can be fun.

So, despite a few missteps, is *Dracula Untold*.

The Book of Life

Produced by the great Guillermo del Toro and directed and co-written by Jorge Gutierrez, this computer-animated feature is a tapestry of motifs from Mexican folklore, both pre- and post-Colombian, especially that culture's version of Halloween, the defiantly festive Day of the Dead.

It starts out in a town in the center of Mexico—which is identified at the beginning of the movie as the "Center of the Universe"—and involves a love triangle.

Said triangle's points are the spirited, big-hearted town beauty, Maria (voiced as an adult by Zoe Saldana) and two local boys, Joaquin (Channing Tatum), a military hero whose fearlessness secretly stems from the talisman of invulnerability he wears, and Manolo (Diego Luna), who descends from a long line of matadors.

Manolo has the chops for that profession except that he can't bring himself to kill a bull.

The outcome of the affair becomes the object of a wager between two gods of the hereafter, and thus *The Book of Life* turns into a crazy cosmic epic, characters turned into elegant skeletal versions of themselves as they journey into the underworld.

Gutierrez manages the feat of making his story feel plausibly traditional while at the same time making it hinge on modern values like feminism and the abolition of animal cruelty.

Also, the movie is full of lovely music, one visual splendor after another, and a really endearing little pig.

It's magnificent.

Stonehearst Asylum

In this period melodrama, opening Oct. 24, an ambitious young fellow (Jim Sturgess) arrives at the spooky, fog-shrouded title institution, late in 1899, asking to learn the ropes of the new field of psychology.

The headshrinker in charge (Ben Kingsley) seems a decent, civilized sort, but soon the new guy realizes that this haven for wealthy crazies harbors a shocking secret.

It won't be that much of a secret to those who have read Poe's 1845 tale "The System of Doctor Tarr and Professor Fether," on which this absorbing, slyly old-school Gothic is based.

But the twists are unraveled skillfully by director Brad Anderson and screenwriter Joe Gangemi, and the cast is hard to beat: Along with Kingsley, there's Kate Beckinsale and Brendan Gleeson and David Thewlis—scary as the asylum's enforcer—and no less than Michael Caine.

Stonehearst Asylum hits the tropes of the madhouse scare picture, but the subtlety of the script and of these actors brings this conventional material some troubling moral ambiguity and shifts in sympathy.

It's a small gem—a horror movie with heart.

Dracula Untold is rated PG-13 and *The Book of Life* is rated PG. Both play at Arizona Mills, Chandler Fashion 20 and other multiplexes Valleywide. *Stonehearst Asylum*, rated PG-13, opens Oct. 24 at AMC Arizona Center.

Aztec runners among Division I top three teams

Corona's boys cross country team may be missing the three senior runners who last year helped it go undefeated, but it does have a group of outstanding competitors who make up one of this year's top three Division I teams. The Aztec runners have taken home firsts in two key meets so far, providing optimism for another possible Division I state championship.

The team's latest win was the 42nd Annual Doug Conley Invitational held Sept. 27 at the Rolling Hills Golf Course, where the Aztecs won for the second straight year with a score of 73, 34 points lower than the second place team, Page, with 107. Hamilton was third with 158.

"The Doug Conley, with some of the best teams in the state, was a good test for us," said coach **Pat Smith**. "It was a good day for the whole team."

Senior **Marcus Wheeler** was the individual champion in the 5,000 meter Elite race with a time of 15:50.91. He crossed the finish line just 2.51 seconds ahead of his Division I main competitor, Tyler Day, of Mesquite. Day barely beat Wheeler at the Ojo Rojos earlier in the season.

"Marcus was a little disappointed after he was beaten at the Ojo Rojos," said coach Smith. "He came out at the Doug Conley and ran a smarter race against Day on the hills to take first place."

What Day doesn't have that Wheeler does is a team of top-quality runners to back him up. Corona's other runners who helped earn the Doug Conley victory include sophomore **Slade Sumner** finishing in sixth place, senior **Alex Hart** 13th, sophomore **Liam Kovach** 26th and senior **Andrew Eversden** 30th.

Corona's younger runners who competed in the junior varsity event at the Conley tied for first place with 41 points. The Aztecs had six athletes finish in the top 16 spots out of 469 participants from 29 schools.

Graham Eversden crossed the finish line in first place with a time of 17:52.82 followed by **Jonathon Lopez** in fifth place, **Kairash Ferozepurwalla** ninth, **Colt Sample** 11th, **Jack Stone** 15th and **Lincoln Johnson** 16th.

Wheeler expanded his lead over Day at the next event, the Desert Twilight XC Festival at the Grande Sports Academy, held Oct. 3, by running his season's best time of 14:53.342 and beating Day's time by 6.134 seconds.

Also running personal best times and helping the Aztecs take third place in the Sole Sports Boys

Sweepstakes race at the Desert Twilight was Sumners (15:44.34), Hart (15:50.32) Andrew Eversden (16:13.20), Kovatch (16:24.52), Graham Eversden (16.44.99) and Lopez (16:47.53).

their personal best times. I couldn't be prouder."

One of runners, senior and team captain Kelly Naumann, came back her senior season ready to prove she was one of the top runners in the state. She has proven it by steadily increasing her times over the season.

For instance, she shaved nearly 39 seconds off her second place finish time of 18:28.40 at the Doug Conley to finish sixth in a race against 152 racers, many from out of state schools, at the Desert Twilight with a personal best time of 17:49.28.

"Kelly has ran been stellar and run spectacular races this season," said coach Ari Rodriguez. "She has not only improved on her finishes from last season but improved her times from race to race running very smart races. I couldn't be happier with her performance."

MacKenzie Harder was the second runner on the team to cross the finish line in 45th place at the Doug Conley followed by **Renee Clary** (50th), **Alexis Artiaga** (57th), **Sidney Bussler** (66th), **Rachel Dietz** (86th) and **Kristina Nedelkova** (87th) out of 110 runners who competed in the 5,000 meter Elite race.

"MacKenzie is very consistent, giving a great performance every race. She is very reliable," said Rodriguez.

"Renee has been suffering with hamstring issues but has tried to tough it out. It will be good to hopefully have her back strong in time for the City Meet."

Running at night at the Desert Twilight XC Festival seems to agree with most of the Lady Aztecs. Almost all of the runners who competed ran personal bests that night.

Riley Wright was the second Corona runner to cross the finish line after Neumann running a personal best time of 20:11.71 followed by Artiaga, Harder, Bussler, Dietz and **Amberly Ricks**. All ran personal bests.

"Riley is really a tough girl with the heart of a lion," said Rodriguez. "I'm not surprised that she runs on our varsity team as only a freshman. She works really hard at every practice and has definitely earned it."

Corona's freshman team was fifth out of the 11 large-school teams that ran at the Desert Twilight. **Mia Da Rosa** led the team finishing 17th, followed by **Abigail Cordiak**, **Josie Wright**, **Kristina Phillips**, **Cybel Cozart**, **Annika Poulin** and **Adria Holiday**.

Corona took seventh out of 33 teams that competed in the large-school open event. Nedelkova

In the boys large school open race, the Aztecs finished in fifth place with Ykema taking fourth place, **Tyler Thompson** ninth, Sample 23rd, **Kairash Ferozepurwalla** 42nd and **Daniel Bish** 80th.

Ykema, Thompson, Sample, Ferozepurwalla, Johnson, Market, Bish and Stone all ran personal best times at the event.

Corona's girls team fell a bit in its placement in the Doug Conley Invitational (9th) and the Desert Twilight (16th) due to injury and some missing members but still had individual runners record personal bests.

"We had a lot of great performances at both meets, but almost everyone on the team ran personal bests at the Desert Twilight," said Ari Rodriguez. "We even had some girls shave two and three minutes off

Division II state champs Tucson Salpointe. The team lost one they were predicted to win at Poston Butte, Oct. 10, 34-26

The game was tied at zero at the end of the first quarter when neither team could move the ball on offense. That aspect changed in the second quarter when the Broncos were able to get inside the Padres' red zone and score a rushing touchdown.

Marcos was able to answer on a 41-yard pass from quarterback **Nazareth Greer** to **Marcus Maldonado** for a touchdown. **Colton Ketterer** scored the point-after kick, leveling out the game at seven points each.

Broderick Drew had one of the better kick-off returns of the season going 44 yards, while **Johnny Bernal** ran one back 30 yards as well.


Jackson Loony punted the ball four times, averaging 31 yards per punt.



Halloween 'creep factor' enhanced by live music Arts center to host rare 'Nosferatu' showing

If the Halloween choices at the multiplexes—see my column on page XX—don't quite cut it for you, have no fear.

Or rather, be very afraid. On Oct. 25 at 7:30 p.m., Tempe Center for the Arts is offering one of the all-time great monsters of the movies: "Count Orlok," the first, albeit unauthorized, screen representation of Count Dracula, in F. W. Murnau's 1922 masterpiece *Nosferatu*.

The movie's subtitle—*A Symphony of Horror*—has particular significance at the Tempe Center's showing. The film will be accompanied by live music—Brahms, Dvorak, Wagner—performed by the Arizona Pro Arte Ensemble, under the baton of conductor Timothy Verville.

I've seen several of these live music/silent movie performances over the years, among them Eisenstein's *Potemkin*, Dreyer's *Passion of Joan of Arc* and the Bela Lugosi version of *Dracula* (an early talkie, but made without a musical score).

If you've never had this experience, I highly recommend it; both the cinematic and the musical sides are enriched.

And if you've never seen *Nosferatu*, you really need to put that on your movie bucket list as well. This is the rare silent film that still genuinely has the power to spook, or to spook me, at least.

The rat-faced, dome-headed, baleful-eyed figure of the vampire Count, played by the unforgettable Max Schreck, is unnerving, more

than 80 years after the film was made.

I can honestly say that I've gotten creeped out, stumbling to the bathroom at three in the morning, imagining that I'd see this bald-pated goblin-Count standing there at the end of the hallway glaring at me.

The movie was made without the blessing of Bram Stoker's widow Florence Stoker, and her successful legal actions bankrupted Murnau's studio and got many prints of the film destroyed. Legitimate though her outrage may have been, it is fortunate for cinema history that a few prints managed a vampire-like survival.

Nosferatu's influence on the horror genre almost can't be underestimated.

It was remade, as *Nosferatu the Vampyre*, by Werner Herzog in 1979, with Klaus Kinski turning in a pretty chilling performance as the Count.

Then in 2000, director E. Elias Merhige gave us *Shadow of the Vampire*, a wry horror picture about the making of *Nosferatu* which suggested that the film's lead actor Max Schreck (an excellent Willem Dafoe) really was a vampire.

Interesting as these and other remakes and homages have been, however, none has the nightmarish atmosphere of the original, and the Pro Arte Ensemble's showing promises to be a particularly fine way to experience it.

Tickets start at \$10, and are available at 480-350-2822.

And if you're in a really macabre mood, feel free to wear your costume to the show.

The Last Word

Tempe offers a counterpoint to Sept. 22 opinion piece

Editor's note: The following statement from the city of Tempe is reprinted in its entirety.

The city of Tempe cares about the safety and appearance of Tempe Town Lake and has worked throughout its 15-year history to create a regional destination that continues to bring significant returns on our residents' investment. The city is proud of Tempe Town Lake and understands its importance to the community.

On Sept. 22, *The Arizona Republic* ran an opinion piece that was as short on facts as it was brief in words. The editorial was based on inaccurate information and contained unfounded, alarmist implications about public health risks.

Post-storm cleanup — Following the storm of Sept. 7-8, the amount of water and debris that flowed into the lake from other sources was significant. When the overflows stopped going over the western dam, a large amount of debris ended up just east of the western dam. The city said that it would take time to clean up that area and conveyed that the first priority was the area between the east and west buoys, where swimming events were planned. In addition to that focus area, crews worked continuously to clean up the whole lake and today it is very nearly back to its typical state.

It is important to note that the city is learning from the experience of the recent storm, as it was more intense than most of us have experienced anywhere — especially in the Valley. We have looked at our lake cleanup procedures and decided we can make adjustments in the future that will allow us to more quickly remove debris next to the west dam. We are evaluating the amount of resources (equipment and personnel) that would be necessary to respond even quicker in the future to the area near the western dam.

Western dam replacement — After the storms, PCL Construction's work on the dam project was slowed — and, for a few days, stopped — for two reasons. First, because water was flowing over the

dam after the Sept. 7-8 storm and workers cannot work in those conditions. Second, after the flows stopped, crews needed to divert water away from the construction site and let the ground west of the dam dry out before moving equipment back in.

Temporary delays in construction had nothing to do with debris collected east of the western dam and it had nothing to do with water quality. Implying that the two matters are linked is incorrect. Dam replacement workers were still working to the extent possible for most of that time. Similar delays will happen throughout the dam replacement anytime there is a major storm event. Crews are back working nearly at 100 percent capacity this week.

It was inaccurate for *The Republic* to imply the dam replacement project is somehow in jeopardy. The dam replacement is not behind schedule and the completion date of Dec. 28, 2015 has not changed. Even if the storm had been more severe and pushed completion into 2016, the city's agreement with Bridgestone allows for delays due to severe weather events.

Special events and water quality — The editorial implied that lake events have been canceled as a result of material near the west dam. A single "splash and dash" event on the evening of Sept. 11 was canceled because the area received more than two-tenths of an inch of rain, triggering the city's retesting policy. Since it takes 24 hours to get test results back, there would not have been enough time to know definitively if the water quality met full body contact standards. Because Tempe takes lake user safety seriously, we did not proceed with the event.

The Sept. 21 Life Time Tri went on as planned, including a swim portion. Event organizers partnered with the city and were prepared for contingencies if the water quality tests had not been what they were. The event organizers Tempe works with are professionals who understand and share our commitment to safety.

E. coli — The science of managing Town Lake water quality is fairly routine and predictable. When we see elevated levels of *E. coli* in the water, it is from runoff that comes from the Indian Bend Wash, our streets and from points east in the Salt River. Runoff contains animal waste and other materials; therefore, *E. coli* is sometimes present. When the levels don't meet state standards, we don't allow full body contact events.

In the past, when *E. coli* levels come back higher than state standards, two things are most effective at bringing levels down significantly and quickly: time and sunlight. These organisms function best in a host — they don't live long in open water. In fact, the city has never needed to treat Town Lake for *E. coli* in its 15-year history.

Mosquitos — The city manages mosquitos at Town Lake. In areas east and west of the lake, a number of other agencies are involved in controlling mosquitos, including Maricopa County, ADOT, the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and others. The city's longtime water quality management firm traps and tests weekly at locations around the lake, and they have done so since before there was water in Town Lake. They trap and test at 13 locations on both sides of the lake, from the upstream area near Tempe Marketplace to the area west of the western dam.

There are no Town Lake mosquito test results before or since the Sept. 7-8 storm that show either a

higher-than-normal level of mosquitos for monsoon season or the presence of West Nile Virus-carrying mosquitos. Town Lake is stocked with fish that would consume mosquito larvae if mosquito eggs were deposited in the lake. To date, no mosquito larvae have been found in the lake during weekly testing of surface water.

Interestingly, the city's contracted water quality expert reports that mosquito levels at the lake proper are lower than before the lake was created. Any seasonal spikes in mosquito numbers typically happen in the marshy areas of the Salt River bed east and west of the lake. That's because mosquitos like shallow, still pools with lots of shade. They don't thrive in deep, largely unshaded, moving lakes with hungry, mosquito-eating fish.

Since the early September storms, Maricopa County reports that it is dealing with a large number of so-called floodwater mosquitos upstream from the lake in the Salt River bed. Those mosquitos are annoying in number but they do not carry West Nile Virus. That said, West Nile Virus is a serious issue and one the city does not take lightly; county-wide there have been 37 confirmed cases of West Nile Virus infections and five deaths so far this year.

Whether there are more mosquitos than normal at Town Lake right now is one issue — again, there aren't, according to recent city tests. But it's another matter altogether for the Republic to repeat and validate an unattributed question about whether there are West Nile-carrying mosquitos without first doing some due diligence to check the facts. It is irresponsible to invoke the specter of West Nile Virus to make a point.

As entities concerned above all with public safety, the City of Tempe and its regional partners have worked and will continue to work to address any real future mosquito concerns at or near the lake.
