Lifelong dedication, lifetime of service A tribute to Rev. Guy Davidson — and a sorrowful farewell

The Rev. Guy Davidson, founding pastor of Grace Community Church and Arizona Community Church, passed away Nov. 7. He was 86.

Doug Ross, one of Davidson's closest friends for decades, remembers a man who was generous, compassionate and personable.

"He was a people person who made time for everyone," Ross said.

"He knew everybody's name and if he found out somebody was in the hospital, he was there."

Davidson moved to Arizona with his family in 1939 but began his life in ministry in Missouri in 1951. In 1965, along with three other families, Davidson and his wife founded Grace Community Church on what was then the southern edge

of Tempe. The first service attracted more people than the church could hold.

Under Davidson's leadership, a Christian school, now known as Grace Christian Academy, began.

In an era before the term "mega-church" had been coined, Davidson was a mega-pastor, Ross said.

"He had tremendous influence in the East Valley and across Phoenix. If there was a public event, he was asked to come and pray." Close friends with the Rev. Billy Graham, Davidson was the one to eventually ordain Franklin Graham.

Beyond his influence locally—he served on the board of Tempe St. Luke's Hospital—Davidson's reach extended across the world. He had a passion for spreading the message of Christianity beyond his homeland, serving on the boards of Samaritan's

Purse, Food for the Hungry and Global Outreach Mission, all aimed at alleviating suffering of the poor while sharing the gospel message.

"At one point, we were in a building campaign and we had quite a fair amount of money in the bank," Ross recalled.


Davidson approached his flock at Grace and told them, "I think God would have us build churches in India."

So they did, while also managing to build up the campus of the church in Tempe. Then, in 1998, he helped found Arizona Community Church.

"Many times, he would preach four times on Sunday, get on an airplane, fly to India, visit there for a whole week, come home and preach again on Sunday," Ross said. "He had energy."

Fifteen years ago, the two men traveled to Cuba on a



Tempe memorial honors those who served, died


A memorial offering the city's expression of gratitude and honor to the police officers, firefighters and police canines who have given their lives in the line of duty will be dedicated at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 6, at Tempe Beach Park.

Residents are invited to join members of the Tempe City Council, Tempe Fire Medical Rescue Department and Tempe Police Department, along with family members of the fallen heroes, to dedicate the memorial.

A Tempe City Council work group including Vice Mayor Robin Arredondo-Savage, Councilmember Joel Navarro, former Vice Mayor Corey Woods and former Vice Mayor Onnie Shekerjian helped this memorial become reality.

"We are grateful to the people and businesses that contributed more than \$175,000 to help build this memorial," said Arredondo-Savage.

"This memorial is just one small way we can show our support for the men and women, as well as the canines, who help our community in times of our greatest needs, and I'm proud of our community for supporting this project." Artist Benjamin Victor sculpted the memorial. Victor's work includes several police, firefighter and war memorials and is displayed at the National Sculpture Society in New York City, the National Statuary Hall in the United States Capitol and elsewhere around the world.



Ray Road tragedy

A tragic accident that killed a young mother and left two small children clinging to life stunned the West Chandler community. Police said Pamela Hesselbacher, 35, was crossing the street with her son, Ryan, age 3, and daughter, Audrey, age 1, at Ray and Ponderosa/College Avenue when a motorist said to be driving with a suspended license ran a red light and crashed into them. A growing memorial with candles, teddy bears and photos has sprung up at the

scene, and a Gofundme page had raised more than \$50,000 at press time. Police arrested William Joseph Epperlein, 39, an employee at the nearby Fry's Marketplace, in connection with the accident. Two local residents who stopped at the memorial to pay their respects said they were friends of the Hesselbachers' brother-in-law. 'Her husband was home cooking dinner when she took the kids for a walk on Saturday,' one said, with tears in her eyes.

Kyrene's new direction provides wider choices than charters

As the Kyrene School District's new superintendent, Dr. Jan Vesely, shared her priorities during two recent community forums, it became clear that greater educational choice is a driving force behind her 90-day plan for the district.

Parents at the forum heard first-hand about new curriculums that could be offered to students in upcoming school years.

At this point, it was noted, the ideas presented are considered options and remain in the planning phase. All curriculum changes will require Governing Board review and approval.

The options will be discussed again at an upcoming study session on Tuesday, Nov. 22. Final recommendations will be voted on at board meeting scheduled Tuesday, Dec. 6.

"Parents should be re-assured that any and all changes will be in keeping with Kyrene standards," said Vesely.

"We are not trying to become similar to the more limited focus of a charter school."

All the proposals are currently available at the district's website on the Superintendent's Priorities page at www.kyrene.org

After receiving Governing Board input and direction, Vesely and her leadership team will go on location by visiting the involved school sites to discuss in person the next steps.

The principal of the Kyrene Traditional Academy-

Sureño Campus in Chandler, Dr. Marianne Lescher, told those attending the forum about the proposed re-design for middle-school grades.

Currently, KTA enrolls only kindergarten to fifth grade; under the new plan it would expand to be available in sixth through eighth grades.

"Our curriculum emphasizes core values and traditional education, including wearing uniforms," explained Lescher.

"KTA is designated as a National Blue Ribbon School for 2015 by the U.S. Department of Education.

Our philosophy is that kids need to know that the work they do in school does matter for their future in life and for college entrance."

Another option being explored for middle-school students is to expand dual-language curriculum to extend through eighth grade.

The dual-language program is now offered at Kyrene del Norte

and Kyrene de Los Lagos elementary schools.

A panel discussion at the forum included teachers, administrator and community members who

explained that an expanded Dual Language program would provide K-8 students with literacy and content in both English and Spanish.

The current principal of Norte, Jaime Soto, said:

"Dual language benefits students both socially and cognitively. We observe our students develop greater non-verbal problem-solving abilities and more flexible thinking in addition to more cultural understanding."

The third option discussed at the forum was to adopt the International Baccalaureate curriculum, which is affiliated with the worldwide IB program.

That program challenges students with a different learning method that encourages them to participate through more personal inquiry and problem solving.

This option would need to become accredited by the IB program guidelines, so it would require more time to implement, noted Spencer Fallgatter, principal of Kyrene de la Mariposa elementary.

All the options under consideration allow families the opportunity to explore the best option for their children.

The district plans to send an email with a link to a survey, which will allow individuals a chance to comment on the options or ask questions.

The survey also will be posted on the district website under the Announcements section.

What's Fido thinking? Pet psychic knows

Another reason to visit Woofstock

"Did you ever look at her and wonder what she was thinking?"

A friend of mine used to ask me this about my Chihuahua Lily, with whom he was infatuated. And the answer, always, was yes.

Lily's face is so soulful that I have no doubt that all sorts of deep thoughts pass through it, and I have often wondered, staring into her bright, reflective eyes, what she was thinking.

If I really wanted to know, I suppose I would take her to see Terri Wallace on Saturday, Nov. 19, at Woofstock at Tumbleweed Park in Chandler.

Wallace will be giving people a clue about what's on their pets' minds at the event from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

"I interpret the language of different species of animals," explains Wallace.

"Cats, dogs, birds, rabbits," although her abilities extend, she says, to "Plants, insects and people." She refers to herself, variously, as an interspecies communicator, an animal communicator or, simply, a pet psychic.

Along with her day job at Acura of Tempe, Wallace freelances at interspecies communication.

The commonest reasons for which people hire her,

she says, are "behavioral or medical issues, or what we call the transitioning process, the death and dying process."

Thus Wallace will also pass messages between people and their departed pets.

"Sometimes people will feel guilty about behavior before the animal died, or they put them down and they weren't sure it was the right thing to do. Stuff like that."

At Woofstock, Chandler's family-friendly free-admission event for dog lovers on Nov. 19, pet owners can line up "and I do 10-minute sessions with them and their pets. Or they can put their names down and come back."

Wallace, who has lived in Tennessee, Florida, Illinois and Maryland as well as Arizona, has been practicing animal communication professionally since she was in her early thirties.

But she says she's been aware of her rapport with animals "Pretty much my whole life. My earliest memory of it was when I was about five and I was walking to school. There were three sparrows and a butterfly and a bee that were always hanging out with me. For me, it was just normal. I always think of animal language as my first language and human language as my second language."

Asked what she means by animal language, Wallace has a hard time defining it precisely.

"Some of them have different accents, or tones," she says.

"Sometimes I just know what they're saying. The biggest thing is, the other being wants to have a conversation. If the other being doesn't want to have a conversation, I can't make them."

Insects, for instance, are much concerned about environmental imbalance, says Wallace. "Everything is out of whack," says Wallace.

"Like the pollinators. If they ever stopped pollinating, there wouldn't be enough oxygen, or food. What it's doing is it's hurting us. A lot of people just don't think it's going to happen, or not in their lifetime, so they don't worry about it."

So what was the most unusual conversation she ever had with animal?

Wallace chuckles. "With a snake," she says.

"I'm not really fond of them," she explains. "I have a healthy respect, but for whatever reason they haven't been my favorite. But I had been helping my parents out, my mom had been having some health issues and she has two goldfish and koi ponds back east, and in the winter they put netting over them to keep leaves and stuff out." One day, Wallace recalls, she saw a five- or six-foot black snake badly entangled in this netting.

"My mom wanted me to just kill it, but that's not what I believe in. So I said to it—it was a female—I said to her, 'I will be happy to help you out of this, but I don't want you to bite me. So Just keep your head down.'"

While cutting the reptile free, Wallace says, she could feel that it trusted her.

"After that, she came up onto the patio and curled up. So I took her to another pond in the back, and said 'don't come back, because if she sees you she'll kill you.'"

mission trip.

Martha Davidson, married to the late pastor for 55 years, said her husband was a man who practiced what he preached. She summed up his legacy in four words:

"He walked his talk," she said. But did she worry about her husband's excursions to developing countries?

"Never. I just knew that he did what he thought he should do and if something happened to him in those places, he was where his heart was," Martha said. The couple didn't have money in the bank early in life, she said, "but we started by faith. He would say, 'God will supply our needs.' And he always did." Guy, she said, was a loving husband.

"He spoiled me, he really did," Martha said. "For many years, on the 10th of every month, we would

celebrate our anniversary. It was a remembrance of how God brought us together and what God had been through our lives."

It wasn't all roses. The couple's son, Carey, fell into illegal drugs and alcoholism, eventually getting arrested. These days, he's a certified interventionist involved in helping people overcome addictions. His father, he said, was there for him.

"He never gave up on me. He always loved me and kept me and let me know that he loved me," Carey said. "When I got arrested as a result of acting out my addiction, he looked at me and he said, 'You know, son, you cannot unscramble eggs, but you've got all the ingredients to make a great omelet. Now let's make an omelet.' I'll never forget that."

Davidson practiced what he preached. He suffered a catastrophic

stroke in 2002, but waged a fierce battle to overcome the paralysis and other lingering effects. For two months, he endured eight hours of daily, grueling rehabilitation. "He was

determined he was going to beat it. Determined," Martha said. "He really did. It was marvelous."

A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 27 at Grace Community Church, 1200 E. Southern Ave.

"Anyone who has sung in a choir at Grace Community Church, Arizona Community Church, or any other

church where Guy has been, is invited to come and sing in the choir," Ross said. The rehearsal takes place at Grace Community Church at 2 p.m., one hour prior to the memorial.

Gifts in memory of Guy Davidson may be designated for the Davidson Memorial Fund at Grace Community Church.

This fund will be split 50/50 between Grace Community campus development and international mission projects, including the building of an electronic library featuring more than 1,000 original sermon outlines created by Davidson over the years. Pastors around the world will have free access to the resources.

SRP EVgo fast-chargers added

Chandler Fashion Square and Arizona Mills mall are among five Valley locations participating in a partnership by Salt River Project and EVgo to provide new electric-vehicle fast-charging stations in SRP's service territory.

In less than 30 minutes, EVgo's DC fast-chargers can deliver close to a full charge to nearly any fast-charge-capable vehicle on the road today.

The stations are part of EVgo's public fast-charging network, which includes more than 750 chargers in 55 or more metro markets throughout the country. The new stations, located throughout the Valley, include both CHAdeMO and CCS adapter coverage, which accommodate the needs of a majority of electric-vehicle drivers.

Currently, there are more than 6,500 electric vehicles in Arizona, and that is expected to more than double in the next four years. The project is part of a collaborative effort between EVgo and SRP to improve air quality in metropolitan Phoenix. Supporting the adoption of plug-in electric vehicles helps benefit the environment by reducing greenhouse gas emissions and dependence on petroleum-based fuels, according to SRP officials.

SRP offers a price plan for electric vehicle owners and an incentive for commercial customers to invest in charging stations for their employees and customers. In addition, more than 80 percent of SRP's mobile fleet operates on alternative fuels including electric, biodiesel and ethanol.

"We are excited that more and more SRP customers are choosing electric vehicles, and it's important that we offer them ways to support that choice," said Kelly Barr, SRP senior director of Environmental Management and SRP's Chief Sustainability and Compliance Executive.

Stations are equipped with DC Fast-Chargers, which can deliver 40 miles of range in as little as 15 minutes, allowing electric vehicle drivers to quickly charge their vehicles while enjoying a movie or a quick bite to eat.

SRP supports electric vehicle drivers through the SRP EV Community, a way for owners to network, learn about new technologies and participate in surveys, forums and research projects to help SRP design programs, materials and information to better serve customers.

Heart-valve repair now less invasive as Chandler Regional adds new technology

One of the latest technologies in cardiac care, transcatheter aortic valve replacement, or TAVR, is now being offered at Chandler Regional Medical Center.

The surgical procedure has been said to repair heart valves without the invasive removal of old, damaged valves.

"This procedure is a real game changer for older patients for whom standard valve replacement is too risky," says Jeff McBee, the hospital's VP of Operations.

"Standard valve replacement requires open heart surgery," said McBee.

"The TAVR procedure is much less invasive and can drastically lessen recovery time and only requires an average of three to five days in the hospital."

The surgery is done in a catheterization laboratory and involves implanting a replacement valve inside of the failing valve site, which eliminates the need to remove old tissue. Once expanded, the tissue in the TAVR device takes over the job of

regulating blood flow.

This innovative technology is relatively new and doctors say it can be a valuable option for patients who need aortic valve repair and currently have limited choices.

TAVR is FDA approved for people who have symptomatic aortic stenosis and are too high risk for an open heart procedure.

This type of heart condition causes the heart to work harder which over time can weaken the heart muscle and cause chest pain, fatigue and shortness of breath.

Most individuals who benefit from the TAVR procedure are older than 70 and have other medical conditions.

"Over the past several years, Chandler Regional has seen a significant growth in our cardiology department," says McBee.

"We are committed to bringing the very best treatments to our patients and with the introduction of TAVR we are in a position to help even more residents in our community."

Tempe study group hears voices of McClintock drivers in 3-hour session

Since making changes to McClintock Drive just over a year ago that included adding bike lanes and removing vehicle lanes, Tempe has been collecting data and feedback from the public.

More than 70 people spoke during a recent City Council work study session, saying how they feel about the changes. City staff responded, providing an update on the project, including data on use of the bike lanes, traffic volumes and safety.

Councilmembers heard a variety of opinions from community members, including those who said the bike lanes have made commuting by bicycle safer and more convenient, as well as some residents who said the changes have increased traffic congestion and commute times.

After more than three hours of discussion, councilmembers agreed that they would like to keep bike lanes on McClintock Drive but want to look at other changes to improve traffic flow and decrease congestion.

They discussed options like narrowing travel lanes, widening the street in some areas in order to add an additional vehicle lane, removing the buffer between the traffic and bike lanes, and creating concrete barriers to separate the bike and vehicle lanes.

At a future study session, a spokesman

noted, staff will present a proposed process for moving forward to explore and develop concepts to achieve the council's goals of keeping the bike lanes while improving traffic flow and decreasing congestion.

The approach reportedly will include public involvement and the ability to evaluate solutions on a segment-by-segment basis, while considering the importance of the entire McClintock corridor.

Tempe made the changes in July 2015 as part of a repaving project, removing at least one lane of vehicle travel in order to add bike lanes between Broadway and Guadalupe roads.

The city maintained a minimum of two vehicle lanes in each direction, along with a middle turn lane, throughout the three-mile stretch.

So-called "candlesticks" were added in a one-mile portion between Southern Avenue and Baseline Road to provide increased separation between vehicles and bikes.


Adding bicycle lanes has been called consistent with Tempe's Transportation Master Plan and General Plan 2040, and as part of the city's commitment to provide travel options for all modes of transportation.

Teens and emotional overload: A primer for adults on spotting the warning signs

"I had no idea!" These are common words spoken after someone has lost a loved one to suicide.

There is no single cause for suicide. Suicide most often occurs when stressors exceed current coping abilities. This may be due to intense emotional overload or an undiagnosed or untreated mental health condition.

Depression is the most common condition associated with suicide. Additionally, anxiety and substance abuse are common factors and teens are becoming increasingly more and more at risk.

As a mother of two teenage girls and a mental health professional, I am exposed daily to the ups and downs of being a teenager in today's overstimulating environment. Amid social media, busy family schedules and pressures to perform well academically, socially and athletically, teens today can easily become overwhelmed by life.

So, how can parents and adult community members help this anxious and overwhelmed age group?

First, if you are a parent or an adult in a mentoring relationship with a teen, be present. Let the teen know that she or he is important and what they have to say is important.

Put down your phone, turn away from your

computer and listen. I mean really listen to what the teen has to say as a person. The most common theme I hear from teens is that they are afraid of being judged or getting into trouble. If you have young children, begin building a healthy, trusting connection early so you can build their trust. This will help them to have more open dialogue with you when they are teenagers and may need to talk about difficult emotions or topics.

If you already have a teen and you are having a hard time connecting, it is not too late. Teens need someone to talk to, and sometimes their peers are not equipped with the emotional stability or knowledge and life experience to know how to help, even if they try.

Don't expect the teen to open up right away. Start building a connection by doing something active that the young person enjoys and talk about things that are not serious. Allow your teenager to relax and feel a sense of camaraderie with you. Be mindful of your reaction and try to see things from your teenager's point of view rather than *only* from your adult point of view.

Doing this will build rapport, trust, and connection with your teen. Check in with your teen on a regular basis to see how things are going with friends, school and extracurricular activities, as

well as their overall emotional and physical health.

Don't wait to be told. Give the teen space to be himself or herself while you provide ways to make well-informed decisions. The key word here is "guide." Be an emotional coach. Teens have the ability to make good decisions, but they can often be made from an emotional place. Try to help your teen to balance logic and emotions. This will help make decisions be made from a "Wise Mind," a term that comes from Mindfulness training.

Lastly, be aware of warning signs of suicide as well as resources that can assist if you see signs of the teen feeling overwhelmed or suicidal.

Warning Signs of Acute Risk for Suicide (Act immediately)

- Threatening to hurt or him or herself or talking of wanting to hurt or kill him/herself.
- Looking for ways to kill him/herself by seeking access to firearms, available pills or other means.
- Talking or writing about death, dying or suicide, when these actions are out of the ordinary.

Corona Division 6A thriller

Corona's girls volleyball team, feeling confident after defeating Xavier in a five-set thriller in the semifinals, easily defeated Mountain Pointe in straight sets, 25-13, 25-21, 25-15, in the finals earlier this month to win the 2016 Division 6A State Championship for the first time since 1991.

Corona, entering the tournament as the No. 3 seed, was not seriously challenged until the semifinals, a match against No. 2 Xavier. The Aztecs won the first two sets 25-23 and 25-18 and seemed to have the momentum and the match on their side, but a

slow start in the third set changed everything.

Xavier won the third set easily 15-25 and the fourth set 18-25 to tie the match at two sets each in the best of five sets.

Xavier seemed to have everything going its way, but Corona was not to be denied. The Aztecs dug in against the Gators, a team which had won six titles in the last 10 years, and took back the momentum and regained their dream of winning a state championship.

Xavier scored the first point in

the deciding fifth set with the score going back and forth until the Aztecs, down 9 to 11, made their move.

"We decided to start in a different rotation in that last set against Xavier trying to create different matchups for us," said head coach **Ben Maxfield**. "Even when we were down 9-11, I believed that we would find a way to win, especially since our middle blocker **Lauren Forte** had just rotated to the front row."

The Aztecs went on a 7-0 run to win the fifth set 15-11 and the match 25-23, 25-18, 15-25, 18-25, 15-11 and earn a chance to play in the finals against Mountain Pointe.

Junior outside hitter **Brooke Nuneviller** had an incredible outing against Xavier with 18 kills, nine digs, two aces and two blocks while senior outside hitter **Erica Ronda** was next with 12 kills, 17 digs and one service ace.

"Brooke and Erica were huge against Xavier. They not only scored so many points for us, they dug a ton of balls, passed really well and served tough," said Maxfield.

Senior middle blocker Forte had 13 kills and junior middle block **Emma West** had nine in the Aztecs' win over Xavier.

"Our hitters were instrumental in our win against Xavier," said Maxfield. "We have four very strong

hitters. We knew if two of them were on, we would be in a good position to win. If all four were clicking, we would be very difficult to beat."

The Aztecs ran a two-setter system this season with both senior **Madi Ruem** and junior **Abby Meyer** each tallying over 20 assists each against Xavier.

"It worked well for us to run a two-setter system this year," said Maxfield. "Both Madi and Abby have their strengths and their weaknesses which created a good balance."

"Abby and Lauren Forte connected really well so we wanted them working together," said Maxfield. "Then Madi is a scrapper on defense and is very tough to beat."

Corona's defense played well against Xavier with very few balls hitting the floor. Altogether the team dug 80 balls. **Camryn Tucker**, the libero, had 27 while the two setters, Ruem and Meyer had 11 each.

"Camryn and our other players who dig up the balls are all very disciplined in their positioning," said Maxfield. "Throughout the past three years they've learned to not hide behind the block. Our blocking also improved tremendously throughout the season which always makes it easier to defend behind it in the back row."

Corona's blocking has progressed steadily over

the season as demonstrated in the 13 total blocks, or 2.6 blocks per set, against Xavier and .

"We've been working on our blocking a lot throughout the season," said Maxfield, "but the biggest difference is we were able to knock both Xavier and Mountain Pointe out of system with our serving so it made them more predictable."

Seniors **Jessica Murphy** and Forte had six total blocks each against Xavier while junior West had five and freshman **Madelyn Noble** four.

"Jessica is the hardest working player I have ever coached," said Maxfield. "Madelyn came into the season well prepared, then she really started to bring more power to her game. She caught up to the speed of the game very quickly."

Corona will lose a total of eight seniors to graduation this spring including **Brooke O'Meara**, **Logan Wallerstedt** and **Keelan Nelson**.

"Brooke is the epitome of a team player," said Maxfield.

"She is a really great passer and defender."

"Logan is a terrific captain on our team, who is willing to do whatever it takes to win," said Maxfield. "In her four years on varsity she has played and contributed to every position except for setter."

Other players contributing to Corona's success on and off the court are **Allie Wade**, **Lexi Vlcek** and **Isis Mitchell**.

Athletic Scholarships

Corona had an unprecedented 13 athletes sign letters of intent to play a sport in college next year. Altogether, three basketball players, two baseball and two softball players, two wrestlers, two volleyball players, one lacrosse player and one golfer signed Nov. 9 in Corona's gym.

Alex Barcello and **Saben Lee**, rated by recruiting sites as the Nos. 1 and 2 high school basketball players in the state from the 2017 recruiting class, are the top players on this year's Aztec basketball team.

Barcello committed to play point guard at Arizona after narrowing his choices to Arizona, Virginia, Butler, Indiana and Stanford in early August. He had an incredible summer club season, averaging close to 20 points a game.

Lee, remarkably fast and athletic player who grew taller and improved tremendously the last two years, both playing for the Aztecs and during the club season, signed to play guard at Vanderbilt in Nashville, TN.

Leilani Peat, a 6-foot guard for Corona's girls basketball team, signed a letter of intent to play at Seattle.

Peat, who has played on varsity since her freshman year, played in 87 games averaging over 10

points, two assists, eight rebounds, two blocks and two steals a game for the Aztecs.

Quinn Flanagan and **Chase Hamilton** signed baseball letters of intent.

Flanagan, a right-hand pitcher who pitched over 52 innings last season with a 1.74 ERA and 57 strikeouts for the Aztecs, signed with Arizona.

Hamilton, who signed to play middle infielder at Colorado Mesa, will be playing his third varsity season this spring for the Aztecs. Last season he played in 27 games where he had 27 hits, 14 RBI's and 44 runs earning a .36 batting average.

Allyssia Sanchez and **Haley Vallejos** signed letters of intent to play softball.

Sanchez will be at Arizona Christian, most likely playing third base next year. At Corona last season, she had 26 hits with 22 RBI's and 14 runs playing in 31 games.

Vallejos, a varsity player since her freshman season, signed to play at Penn State. She played in 32 games last season as catcher for the Aztecs, where she tallied 173 putouts on defense while batting .357 with 35 hits, 21 RBI's and 14 runs.

Vincent Dolce and **Brandon Konecny** both signed letters of intent to wrestle for Air Force. Dolce and Konecny are both All-Americans who will be competing with the Aztec wrestling team this season before heading off to the Air Force Academy when they graduate.

Lauren Forte and **Erica Ronda**, both members of the Aztecs' championship volleyball team, signed letters of intent to play volleyball at the next level.

Forte, the leading blocker on Corona's team, will be playing indoor volleyball for the California State Bears while Ronda will be playing beach volleyball at

Arizona State University.

Forte, a four-year varsity player at Corona, played in 321 sets over her high school career, amassing 605 kills hitting .293 with 307 blocks as a middle blocker on the team.

Ronda, also a four-year varsity player for the Aztecs, played both front and back row in 416 sets over the four years. She tallied 1069 kills, 781 digs, 110 blocks and 185 service aces.

Emma Lower, a member of Corona's girls golf team, signed a letter of intent to play golf at Hawaii-Manoa. Lower has played one of the top spots on the golf team since her freshman year and was the top player on the team the last two years.

Lower is currently ranked No. 24 by the Junior Golf Association finishing as high as first in the Tempe City Junior Championships in late July and sixth at the Thunderbird Junior Classic in early June.

Erin Langley signed a letter of intent to play lacrosse for Adam State. Langley, who plays for the East Valley Girls Lacrosse Club, has five years' experience playing midfielder and attacker.

Exhibit on track for trip back to Tempe's railroading heyday

The evolution of trains – not to mention the basis of Tempe's current transit system—wheeled its way into the Tempe Historical Museum during the recent opening of the Trains in Tempe exhibit.

Cowboys dressed in authentic Western gear led visitors into the new exhibit, while others rode from the parking lot to the entrance in a small-scale train.

"We really focused on the Salt River Valley and Tempe in particular," Brenda Abney, Tempe Historical Museum manager, said. "We discussed why trains first came to Arizona, and then we did an historic overview of the trains that came to the Valley in 1887, all the way up to future endeavors, such as the streetcar."

Kids, wearing conductor hats and other train worker garb, sent messages to each other using Morse code and interactive maps and explored railroad stations and bridges previously operated in the Tempe area.

"This is how they used to send texts," Shannon Reid explained to her two children, who perused the old telegraph station.

The Tempe Historical Museum will also add displays throughout the year, including kid activities in June and July.

Other artifacts on display included vintage uniforms, authentic-china dining sets used by passengers, bells, lanterns, old train tickets—even a rifle used in an original shooting from a cowboy skirmish.

The grand opening of the exhibit was introduced by Marshall Trimble, Arizona's official state historian, who briefly reviewed the history of trains and the impact it had on the area.

"It was Sept. 29 of 1887 when the first train came into Arizona," Trimble said. "We went from walking 4mph to going 25mph."

Visitors during the opening of the Trains in Tempe exhibit enjoyed some acoustic blues performed by Mr. Mudd and Mr. Gold, a guitar and banjo duo. Cowboy performers with the Jake n' Jane Wild West Shows entertained families and kids, while taking photos throughout the event.

"The history is just really fun for adults, and the interactive area was perfect for him (her son)," Tempe resident Brooke Wolfe, who attended the exhibit opening with her husband and kids, said. "It's was a lot of fun and we love coming over to the library with our kids."

The Trains in Tempe exhibit will be displayed through October 2017, and is located at the Tempe Historical Museum on the southwest corner of Rural Road and Southern Avenue.
